Ethical counseling in the age of personalized medicine and diversity issues

In our era of globalization and personalized medicine, the daily activity of a hospital is fraught with ethical controversies and difficult ethical decisions to be made by clinicians, patients and caregivers. Frequently, these decisions become entangled in gender issues, cultural differences, moral values and religious beliefs. Under these circumstances, the need for ethical decision-making support has grown.

In this symposium, we want to investigate how the three terms involved in this topic (ethical counseling, personalized medicine, diversity) are interlaced, and how they can be positively connected in order to increase the empowerment of patients and the quality of the ethical choices for patients.

Liesel Beckmann (1914–1965)



Liesel Beckmann was the first female professor at Technische Hochschule München (now TUM). She received her degree in Economics in 1937 at the University of Bonn, where she also finished her doctoral degree in Business

Administration one year later. She followed her teacher, Professor Rössle, to Technische Hochschule München in 1938 and became his assistant, which also gave her the possibility to teach. She was awarded her postdoctoral degree for a thesis on *The Position of Skilled Trades in Economics*, and became an Associate Professor of Business Economics in 1946.


